Glatthaar and a new preface by Grady McWhiney, *Grant, Lee, Lincoln and the Radicals* continues to shape and illuminate the scholarship on these central Civil War figures.

Prokopowicz that imagines a hypothetical second term for the president, emphasizing the differences between Lincoln and his successor, Andrew Johnson. Barry Schwartz's contribution presents original research that yields fresh insight into Lincoln's evolving legacy in the South, while Richard Wightman Fox dissects Lincoln's 1865 visit to Richmond, and Orville Vernon Burton surveys and analyzes recent Lincoln scholarship.
